


# Harlem Renaissance Crossword Puzzle

- 3 She was an American folklorist, anthropologist, and author. Best known for her 1937 novel "Their Eyes Were Watching God."

- 9 He is regarded as the "Father of the Harlem Renaissance".
- 13 The Father of Harlem Radicalism.
- 14 Incorporates repetitive phrases, improvisation, and the syncopated rhythms of blues and jazz.
- 15 She was a white patron of the Harlem Renaissance
- 19 This militant sonnet, "If We Must Die," was written by this African-American poet.
- 21 This term was coined by James Weldon Johnson to name a period of riots in 1919.
- 22 The official magazine of the NAACP.
- 23 A movement that seeks to unify African people into "One African Community."
- 24 He was an intellectual leader in the US as a sociologist, historian, civil rights activist, Pan-Africanist, author, and editor. Leader of NAACP and founder of "The Crisis."
- 25 The name of Locke's 1925 anthology. Some people referred to the "Harlem Renaissance" as this.
- 26 African-American author of the 1923 novel "Cane."

- 1 An American poet, social activist, novelist, playwright, and columnist.
- 5 The official publication of the National Urban League,
- 6 "The Autobiography of an Ex-Colored Man" first published anonymously in 1912. Later it was published again in 1927, and this African-American was cited as the author.
- 8 This conflict waged in Europe from 1914-1918. The US entered this conflict in 1917. The US drafted 2.8 million men into the US Military.
- 10 "Three Plays for a Negro Theatre", featuring African American actors conveying complex human emotions and yearnings, was written by this white playwright.
- 11 He was a white patron of the Harlem Renaissance.
- 12 This brought hundreds of thousands of African Americans to cities like Chicago, Philadelphia, Cleveland, and New York City.
- 16 Nickname for the the 369th Infantry known for being the first African-American regiment to serve during World War I.
- 17 After the 1929 Stock Market crashed, this downward economic cycle began.
- 18 A cultural movement that spanned the 1920s and 1930s.
- 19 He was a distinguished African American Sociologist. During the 1920's he was the Research Director of the National Urban League.
- 20 He led the "Back to Africa" movement.
- 22 The first newspaper of the "New Negro Movement."
