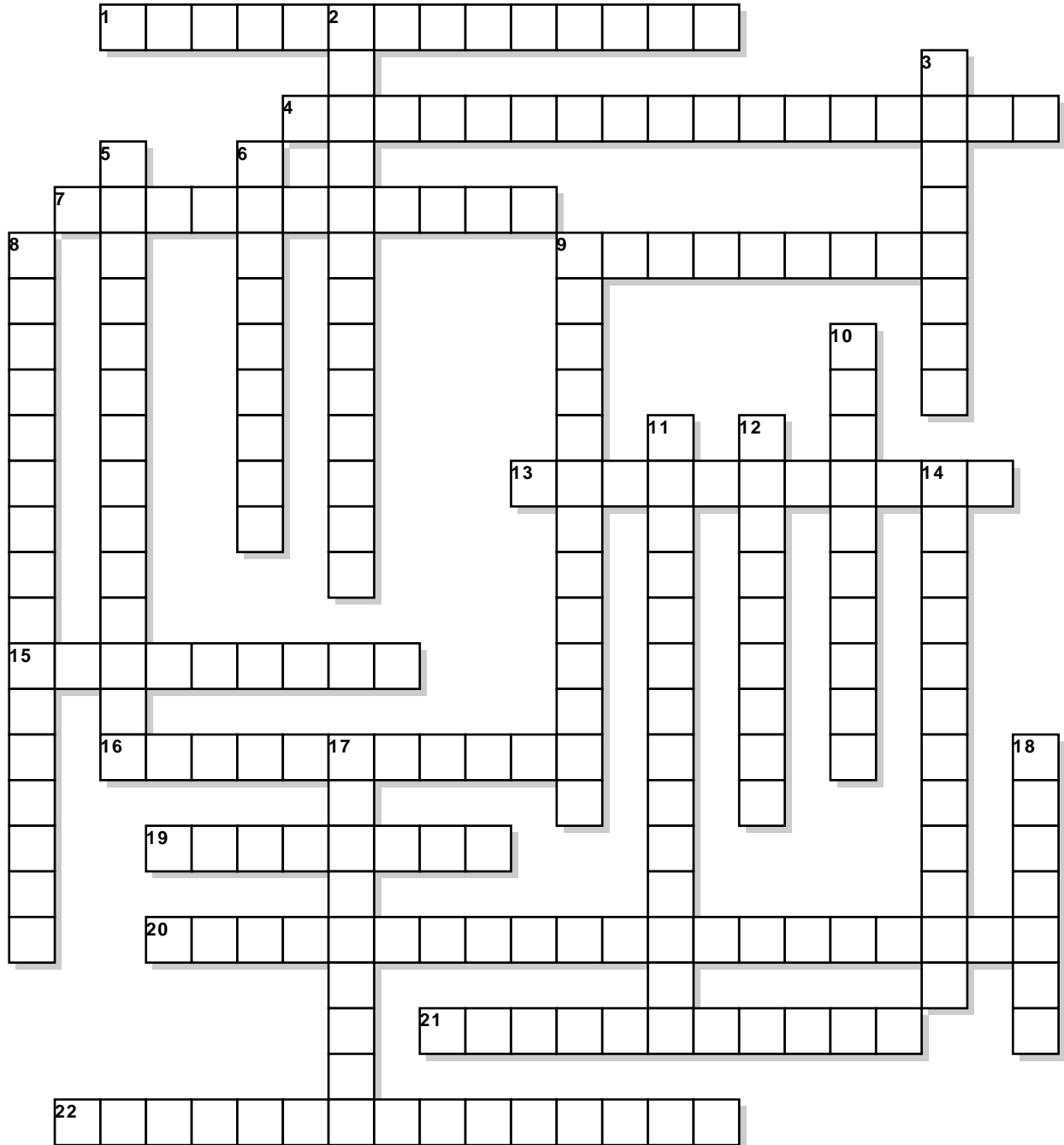


European Competition In North America

- 9 The name of the Dutch colony in North America.
- 10 The Dutch built this in 1614 near the modern city of Albany, NY.
- 11 She came to the English throne in 1558. She was a Protestant.
- 12 French Protestants who founded a colony called Fort Caroline.
- 14 The Dutch founded this town in what is now present-day New York City.
- 17 The Dutch bought this island from Native Americans.
- 18 Daring sailor who attacked Spanish Galleons that were transporting gold and silver.
