

- Another name for slavery.
- 4 A covert network of people and places that assisted fugitive slaves as they escaped slavery in the South. It included meeting places, secret routes, passageways and safe houses.
- 6 Fugitive slaves kept their eye on this to guide them in the right direction to freedom.
- 8 The eleven states that withdrew from the United States to form their own country.
- 9 The name referring to the United States during the Civil War, which was supported by 20 free states and five border slave states. Often referred to as "the North."
- 11 South Carolina was the first state to do this.
- 14 Men who hunted runaway slaves.
- 16 The homes and businesses that were stopping points to harbor runaway slaves.
- 19 A person who flees or tries to escape; a refuge.
- 20 A person who moved fugitives from one "station" to the next on the Underground Railroad.
- 22 Allowed for slave owners to pursue their fugitive slaves into free states and territories. These fugitives could be returned south and put back into a condition of slavery.
- 23 Violent uprising against an authority or government.

- 2 A password used by Quakers and others who were part of the Underground Railroad meaning the person was bringing runaway slaves to be hidden.
- 3 Harriet Tubman was born in this state.
- 5 This addition to the Constitution made slavery illegal in the United States.
- 7 A Quaker group. They were among the first whites to denounce slavery in America and Europe, and they were the first organization to stand against slavery and the slave trade.
- 10 The white man who was in charge of the slaves working the fields on a plantation, a foreman. Often cruel.
- 12 Slaves running away on the Underground Railroad.
- 13 She led hundreds of enslaved people to freedom on 19 trips along the route of the Underground Railroad.
- 15 The process of freeing from bondage a person or animal
- 17 A person that wanted to do away or end slavery.
- 18 The person who ran the home or business that was a station, or stopping point, on the Underground Railroad.
- 21 A line of animals or slaves fastened or chained together.
